My friend and former coordinator of CBF of South Carolina, Marion Al-dridge, wrote a very meaningful article I want to share with you as we dream about God's future together.

"I have coined a new word: CHURCHCRAFT. *What I mean by Churchcraft is an individual's ability to say and do the things that will help to build the organized church.* My observation is that a lack of Churchcraft is the number one reason churches and pastors fail. In the 20th century, I might have called it churchcraftsmanship. Some people think I'm referring exclusively to the "soft skills" that pastors, staff and laity need for a church to succeed—the ability to negotiate, to compromise, to listen, to sell an idea, to understand limits, to provide leadership, to exhibit social graces—and I do mean those. God help the church's pastor, staff or lay leadership are bulls in a china shop!

But Churchcraft is much more. It is also...

- The ability to conceive, develop, implement and evaluate an event.
- The ability to create a plan to overcome a budget deficit.
- Time management, showing up, being on time, finishing the task.
- Work ethic
- Knowing when to speak prophetic and challenging words and when to say pastoral or encouraging words
- Understanding congregational history, and the ability to recognize congregational landmines.
- The ability not to create congregational landmines!
- Making sure that buildings are maintained.
- Discovering and honoring appropriate congregational rituals.

Combined Worship Service

Dr. Molly Marshall will be our featured guest on March 1st as we celebrate the Martha Stearns Marshall Month of Preaching. Sponsored by the Baptist Women in Ministry, The event is both a celebration of women in the pulpit and an opportunity to educate congregations about women in ministry.

Dr. Marshall, President and Professor of Theology and Spiritual Formation of Central Baptist Theological Seminary states on her bio *"I view my vocation as an "equipper of ministers," a midwife of grace who helps deliver what I discern is struggling to be born in the lives of students. Theological education is a process of discovering and refining calling and gifts—learning where one's "great gladness meets the world's deep need," in the words of Frederick Buechner.* Dr. Marshall served as Pastor Steve's Doctor of Ministry Supervisor and he is very honored to be one of her students.

Women's Day at Midway Baptist is a celebration of the calling and gifts of women, and a reminder that God does indeed call women to the work of the kingdom.



Pastor's Insight (Continued)

- Knowing when new skill sets are needed and then learning them (or enlisting someone who has them).
- Understanding when you need to recruit volunteers and then delegating responsibility to them.

The two most common enemies of Churchcraft are probably 1) ego, which is a character issue, and 2) lack of intelligence, which is a capacity issue.

That Ego is a problem is obvious. When a pastor, a deacon chair, or Sunday school teacher thinks he or she is always right, there is no room for growth, change or compromise. Absolute certainty may be good for some things but it is rarely helpful in a Baptist congregation. We have all heard of or experienced ecclesiastical horror stories about people who were willing to split a church over the color of the carpet. One way of expressing this predicament is by asking, "Is this the hill I want to die on?" or "Is this the hill I want this church to die on? (which helpfully reminds us that Jesus' death on the cross was for the salvation of the world and not about the color of the carpet!).

The other enemy of good Churchcraft is ignorance. Some cannot hold complex thoughts in their minds. Their world is black and white, all or nothing, right and wrong, good and evil, and anyone who thinks differently than they do they believe to be demonic. Even when I am right, surely there is something I can learn from the "opposition." Some people, even in the church, do have the gift of empathy. These people should not be elected as congregational leaders.

When the Deep South finally integrated, the NAACP adopted a policy of gradualism, of incremental change. The alternative to incremental change is revolution. Jesus, of course, was (and is) a radical, and not the best example of someone working within an institution. He preached utter and immediate transformation, and he was murdered. Christians, according to Reinhold Niebuhr, need to make a personal decision about whether they will be prophetic (and likely end up as martyrs) or, alternatively, work within the system.

Some people are called to hang in there with the spiritual skill of organizational leadership. Pastors and staff must have this gift and hopefully, every church will have laity who are able to take the long view. Gossips, saboteurs, blamers, second-guessers, the ignorant, the petty, the irresponsible and the fearful do not have either the capacity or the character to possess Churchcraft. Churchcraft involves building coalitions of very different people. Any pastor who doesn't pay attention to choirs and to the people who love music is foolish. A good church leader tries to make a place, even in the most conservative congregations, for the boundary-stretching rowdiness and the challenges of the younger generation. Any pastor or deacon chair who does not know congregational members have different collegiate and political loyalties is naive. Saints and Sinners! Maybe one of the best descriptions of a successful Christian congregation is that it is full of grace and radically inclusive!

I never said Churchcraft was easy, just that it is necessary."

Let's GROW the church together with God.

Habitat for Humanity

Doug Searcy would like the church community here in Midway to help spread the word that there will be a Habitat Midway build at 209 E. Stephens Street this year probably starting in May. They are in need of some building leadership for example, someone to oversee the build much like Ron Miller did on the latest house built in Midway on Winter Street. Habitat would certainly consult with this person but this leader would set the work schedule and be on site most days anyone is working. Habitat would send them volunteers and have experienced volunteers working as well. Habitat would like for the church community to except this as a local mission opportunity and hope that area churches will be more involved with the build this year. We will not be asking the churches to raise funds. Habitat already has the money to build this house. Doug Searcy says that it is sometimes harder to get mission volunteers to work locally than it is to send delegations to some foreign place. Habitat is praying that it might be easier to get area friends involved since it is right here at home. They appreciate all the help with last year's build. The project turned out great. They are also taking applications for buying a habitat house. The home in Midway will be an energy efficient 3 bedroom, 1 1/2 Bath home on a large lot suitable for a family of 4 or more people. Family income between \$20,000 and \$50,000 depending on family size are being considered.

What MBC Means to me by Don Dobson

Presentation during worship on 2/1/2015

A few weeks ago, Pastor Steve asked me to do a 2-3 minute presentation on what Midway Baptist Church means to me. He went on to say, “the folks do not see enough of you.” I responded by saying my impression is that they see too much of me. But then thinking about it, I guess most of what I do is actually behind the scenes. Although I do donate a substantial amount of time on a continuing basis, most of the results of that work are not visible. The reason for mentioning time donation will become clear in a moment.

So why is Midway Baptist Church important to me? Simply put, it is the support and benefits I can both derive and give by interacting with the church people. Of course we know that this building is not the church. The scriptures teach that the church is a group of believers and followers of Jesus – those who honestly try (imperfect though they may be) to actually follow what Jesus taught. This church has quite a few of those types.

Let me take you back to December, 2012. On the Sunday that our new pastor was supposed to participate in his first Christmas dinner celebration with his new church, something unexpected happened. In the dark of the morning about 3:30am, Venona was taken to the hospital. She was bleeding internally following a simple hernia surgery. Her blood radiator was just about empty. After numerous blood transfusions, and efforts to stop the bleeding, the doctor determined that she would have to have surgery. The trip to surgery was truncated by a severe reaction to one of the anesthetics which apparently triggered an enzyme indicator that she may have had a heart attack. Now off for a heart catheterization. This came back OK, so she went back into surgery again.

However, by this time it was near the end of the day – getting dark. All day long it seemed that each new bit of news was bad. I realized that she might not make it. The waiting room was empty except for my family, several of you now listening to me and Pastor Steve. In spite of encouragements to leave to attend the Christmas dinner, Steve remained until the surgery was completed and the first bit of good news came from the doctor. It would have been totally OK for him to leave, but instead he missed his first Christmas dinner at his new church –because he cared. Now while all this was going on at the hospital, I am totally confident that the folks at the dinner were providing prayer support for Venona.

While I won’t go into detail, something, in many respects similar, happened with Allen last April. MBC was equally supportive in that case. You don’t put a price on that.

So now, a bit of Don’s philosophy on this subject. What one gets from any activity or relationship is directly related to what one puts into the activity or relationship. To derive maximum benefit from the relationship with my church, I believe, Jesus expects me to support the church with my time, my money, my attendance, my prayers, and to do my best to model my behavior (both privately and publicly) after his teachings.

Whenever I think about volunteer service, I remember Louis and Josephine Wash. As we know, Josephine’s health limits what she can do. Yet every Sunday Louis and Josephine will pick up about 20 bulletins. They personally deliver some of them to shut-ins and some are mailed to others. Nobody asked Louis and Josephine to do this task. They simply saw an opportunity for service and began doing it. Whenever a serious illness triggers a special prayer request, Josephine is on the phone. Such initiative is to be complemented.

Of course, all of this takes time and other resources. I said earlier that I donate a considerable amount of time to church service and Disaster Relief. Sure, with the skills that I have been blessed to have, I’m pretty sure that I could sell that time for a rate more than the minimum wage. So why don’t I do that. Simply put, folks, I believe I am getting a better deal.

April 5, 8:30 a.m. & 10:45 a.m.

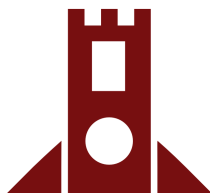
Join us at 8:30 or 10:45 a.m. on Easter Sunday, as we celebrate the resurrection with seasonal music and preaching.
